## Fox Run Nature Center - Updates!

ear Friends, with a new season just around the corner, I want to thank you for your continued support of the El Paso County Nature Centers, as well as share some updates about the Northern Nature Center, now called Fox Run Nature Center.



For many years, one of the most in-demand summer nature camp weeks is at Fox Run.

The need for a northern nature center was identified in the El Paso County Parks Master Plan in 2013, based on projected population growth and public surveys. Then the Feasibility Study in 2020 recommended Fox Run Regional Park as the ideal location. Currently, we have established a design team that is working on a comprehensive design for the new center and how it fits into the location and surroundings. The process includes determining the exact location, engagement meetings with stakeholders and the public, creating the

concept design, then more public meetings before the final design. Currently we are on track to have construction beginning in 2024: isn't that exciting?!?

To get this building constructed, our team will also be working on finding funding for this project. El Paso County has already shown support by approving to spend \$1.5 million. The capital campaign has kicked off with a goal to raise \$3.5 to \$5 million, and significant donations have already been received.

The Fox Run Nature Center will be an investment in future generations to inspire and create stewards of the environment in the Pikes Peak region. The center will provide opportunities for visitors to develop connections to the natural environment and will strengthen the relationship between visitors and the ecosystems and cultural histories of Black Forest and Palmer Divide. It will also provide a community resource for environmental education, outdoor

recreation, and community

involvement in the northern El Paso County.

# **Volunteer Highlight:** Eileen Somers, Parks Volunteer of the Year





## New to the Team: Education Reptiles! by Jessica Miller, Supervisor, Fountain Creek Nature Center

ountain Creek Nature Center is now the home of two new education reptiles! Ferdie the Bullsnake and Kéya the Ornate Box Turtle were both donated to the Nature Center and were originally born in and taken from the wild right here in El Paso County. They will live out their days in human care while performing a very noble duty - teaching visitors about their species, both of which can be found in Fountain Creek Regional Park.

Ferdie the Bullsnake is pretty shy, so when he isn't napping under his log he enjoys burrowing underground in his habitat. Bullsnakes are nonvenomous and not a threat to people. In the wild

they eat rodents, rabbits, and occasionally even birds, lizards, and other snakes. They are common along our trails and can grow past six feet! Ornate Box Turtles like Kéya are terrestrial, living in prairies, pastures, and open woodland unlike their aquatic cousins. They are omnivores and enjoy a variety of fruits, veggies, and bugs. A favorite food in the wild are dung beetles found in cow patties! Populations are declining due to habitat loss, road mortalities, and being taken from the wild to be pets.

You can see them in their enclosures at Fountain Creek Nature Center, and you may get to meet them during some programs! Their beautiful cages are thanks to our Partners in the Park, Olson Plumbing and Heating, and the Friends of El Paso County Nature Centers supports their daily care. Perhaps one day Ferdie and Kéya will write an article for the newsletter...



## **Fountain Creek Happenings**

W inter can be a challenging time of year for me. The combination of colder temperatures, fewer daylight hours, and disappearance of some wildlife is tough for someone who loves spending their free time outside and observing! Despite these challenges, winter provides the perfect opportunity for honing one's detective

skills. While some animals have migrated to warmer latitudes and others have settled in for their long winter nap, there are still plenty of creatures that are around and active at Fountain Creek Nature Center; you just have to look for the clues they've left behind! Watch out for trees with bark stripped by a white-tailed buck marking their territory and preparing for rut, raccoon and bobcat tracks in the snow or mud, coyote scat along the trail, disturbed squirrel caches, and take advantage of the bare branches to find nests among the

treetops. Being a detective is fun but when I am feeling less investigative I can almost always count on seeing white-tailed deer in Magic Woods, fox squirrels chasing each other around the trees, and our winter birds watching from the feeders. What clues will you uncover the next time you visit one of our trails?

Walking into work one morning in late fall, a hiker excitedly informed me that he'd just seen twin bobcats in a tree nearby. I raced inside to grab my comrades and we jogged quickly to the tree in question. What did we see? Nothing. A couple of weeks later, several sets of guests created a fervor with the tale of sighting a bear along Creek Bottom. Once again, led by Mary Jo, the staff searched diligently along the trail where the guests said they saw the bear. We even went further along to make sure we didn't miss it. What did we see? Nothing. When several groups of walkers let us know with utmost certainty that they'd seen a big bear down near the bridge on the Regional Trail, some of us didn't even rise from our chairs.

However, Kylee, Ryan, and Sherry, undaunted, went on the search. What did they see? **Nothing.** And so, the phenomena we call "The Curse of the Blue Shirts" has continued since fall. Theories abound as to why our staff never saw the interesting animals our guests report but we're hoping it doesn't last all winter.
